## Managers Korner

MAY 2017

When given a gift, accept gracefully.

2 weeks ago, my sister, who lives in NY was reluctantly convinced to go over a friend's home for dinner. Upon returning she was met a block away by one of her friends frantically looking for her. Her friend told her she cannot go home because her apartment was on fire and that her dog had perished in that fire. Since this happened my sister has complained endlessly with the "why always me" syndrome. It was later found out that there was a gas leak in the wall behind the stove and the place exploded. The Fire Dept said that whatever happened in the apartment happened instantly and no one (including the dog) would have heard or felt anything or survived. In NY to find an apartment with a large pet (the dog was 95 lbs) is nearly impossible unless you pay a \$4-500 monthly premium, which my sister did( \$1300 for a usual \$800 studio). Although a tragic loss of a 12 yr pet and friend she now has the opportunity to move near her 3 grandkids, travel and visit more regularly and move closer to her job in the City, all for a reasonable cost of living. Although a life (her pet) was lost, a new beginning and the gift of her life was granted. I know it's easier said than done, and we have all been there and do not realize it initially but simply put when given lemons, make lemonade.

Accept gracefully.

With many of our residents making plans or already taking off for their northern adventures this month's managers' report is another repeated reminder of what necessary steps need to be taken so we (the Board, Management, and your full-time neighbors) know and are aware of in case of any issues in and around your vacated home. Many of the items listed

below are common sense items and it would be not only beneficial for you, as a homeowner, but as a considerate neighbor. For those who have prepared and worked for or who have been lucky enough to have the opportunity to travel for a few months and get the benefit of great weather and to visit friends and relatives throughout the States, it is only asked that you protect your investment by taking the necessary steps. Thank you.

**Car and Golf Cart covers-** please do not use blankets, sheets, pillow cases, rags and kite string and expect them to last thru our stormy season. Make an effort to use a recommended professional car or golf cart cover that will make it thru this next and many other seasons without looking like a Brooklyn back yard of hanging laundry. I have seen enough of that.

**Pressure wash homes-** 4 sides to each home - make sure they are clean and free from damaging mold. I say this for your protection- mold can get under the siding to areas you do not see until its way too late and will cause massive damage and an added expense for repairs – not to mention health issues- I speak from experience on this so take my word for it. \$50-100 now will save you plenty down the road.

Please clear of debris completely around your home during the time you are not here and we experience 40-50 plus MPH winds. We have resident volunteers who read the meters throughout the year and we get some pretty surprised looks when the see the conditions behind some homes. I understand you put items there so you don't have to look at them – well- neither do your neighbors, guests, or staff.

**Clean up debris-** Flower pots with no flowers, already dead ones or those that will die when you are not here or not taken care of. Please remove them- pot and dead flowers both. Ornamental items that are subject to blow over must be secured- during the stormy season we straighten many a blown over duck, lamb, kitten whatever statue. This is something the person watching your home should be aware of.



**Clear access to sprinkler system-** last year we had to struggle to get over chairs, tables, whatever to get to some timers that needed service. Please decide to organize better or make plans to have the timer moved for better access when staff or the person watching must get to it for service. Also, to keep in mind the sprinkler and City water valves and shutoff in the rear of the home need to be protected. Many systems are still unprotected from the weed whackers or mowers. Simply add a few bricks or border stone around these plastic pipes and fill with either rocks or mulch. There is no excuse for these plastic pipes to be subject to getting busted. Remember, these are your lawns – we just help take care of them.

**SPEEDING**- see attached report from the radar detector that was placed on our property from the Tarpon Springs Police department- to briefly recap

4069 cars passed the detector  
1782 were clocked OVER 15mph (42%)  
734 were clocked OVER 20mph (18%)  
62 were clocked OVER 26mph  
5 were going over 30MPH

And this is going up the hill to a traffic area by the clubhouse and mail boxes

How fast are you going on straightaways on Skyline and Azalea – not to mention down the hill on the way out of the association?

**NEED I SAY MORE?!!!!**

**SNOWBIRD FLY AWAY FORMS-**

**Mandatory for this year**

**WHO IS WATCHING YOUR HOME WHEN YOU ARE GONE:** This does not mean you only get a call when the place is on fire. Watching your home includes, shrub cutting, reporting to the homeowner and scheduling for any mold to be pressure washed off, secure any flying debris if not properly secured when storms are expected.

**YOU MUST SPECIFY WHO IS MAINTAINING YOUR SPRINKLER SYSTEM ON THE FORM-**we have many residents who have nothing on file for years now and if there is no form on file this year again and IF we must maintain YOUR sprinkler system – there will be an escalating cost to you.

Maintaining the system includes:

**WEEKLY CHECKS** for:

1. check for proper start and run time – during power outages timers will reset to 10 minutes a day 7 days a week
2. Clear sprinkler spray – clogged heads or overgrown bushes or grass blocking the spray heads
3. Broken heads- during the summer months the property gets mowed weekly – busted heads are fairly common and going 2 or so weeks in a particular area without proper water will stress and kill areas of lawn.

**FINAL REMINDER:** If you need help understanding your system – feel free to ask for simple instructions. Staff will be more than willing to offer help. All systems have an OFF mode-(for when it rains 2-3-4-5 days in a row) a MANUAL mode (for when you want to check your system at any time of the day) and simple settings that make it easy to understand and set (if for some reason the system resets).

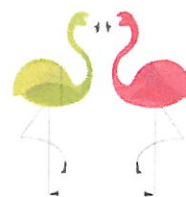
PS: Change your battery- the battery does not run your system – it only holds the settings for a short time during power outages. During longer power outages, your system may have to be reprogrammed.

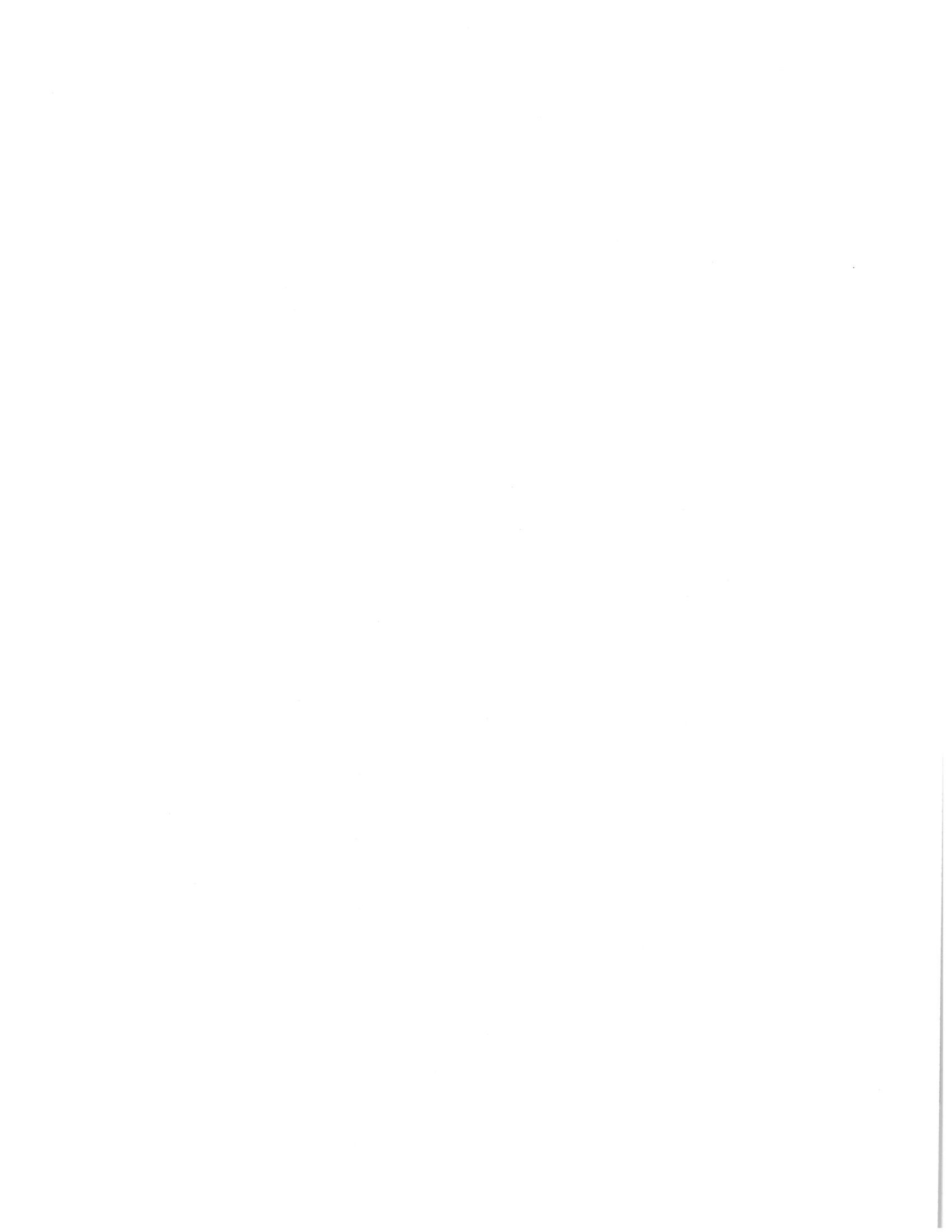

## DROUGHT STRESSED LAWNS

Turfgrass plants are 70% to 75% water, which indicates the importance of moisture in maintaining a vigorous, healthy, growing plant. When grasses lose more water through the leaves than they absorb through the root system, the plants become stressed.

### Drought Stress Symptoms

The early stages of drought stress are seen as turfgrass changing color from bright green to a dull gray or blue-green color. Footprints and lawn mower wheel tracks remain for a



period of time and the grass does not spring back upright. As plants begin to wilt the grass blades roll or fold. With additional stress, the turf loses its green color and becomes yellow, then tan. A tan color indicates drought dormancy.

### Drought Stress Damage

Grass plants that are in drought stress are often damaged by foot traffic and mowing. Do not mow lawns that are in drought stress. The grass is not growing, and the plants have less moisture content to protect the cellular structure from collapse and permanent damage.

Broadleaf weeds and weedy grasses in drought stressed lawns may outgrow the turf and create an uneven appearance. However, even mowing the lawn at a high cutting height to cut off tall weeds may still result in lawn damage. When a lawn is dry, mower wheels often leave stripes across the lawn when the grass blades are broken and damaged by the weight of the wheels.

### Factors Affecting Drought Stress

Some turfgrasses such as bermudagrass and tall fescue have more tolerance of low moisture conditions than other grasses. Centipedegrass, bentgrass, and annual bluegrass are more prone to drought stress, and will lose green color quickly when soil moisture is low.

Heavy clay soils and sandy soils are not favorable for growing turf during periods of low moisture. The clay holds the moisture so tightly that grass roots cannot retrieve moisture, while sandy soils have a low moisture holding capacity.

Turf roots growing in thatch rather than in soil can result in a grass more prone to drought stress. Thatch is a layer of dead but undecomposed roots and stems above the soil. Thatch acts like a sponge. It quickly absorbs rainfall, but also dries out rapidly, leaving plant roots dry even after rainfall or watering.

Lawns mowed shorter than recommended for a grass type may have a shallow root system growing in the soil. A shallow root system dries quickly even when thatch is minimal.

### Managing Turf During Drought

Water the lawn once grass begins to discolor and wilt. If it is not possible to water sufficiently to keep grass green, water the lawn with at least 1/2 inch of water every 7 to 14 days. This light watering will help keep the plants alive even if they are dormant. Do not mow the lawn during hot weather when signs of drought stress are present.

## DEALING WITH DROUGHT FAQs

### Watering

**Q:** When should I water?

**A:** Deep soaking is important because it encourages development of deep root system. Light rains or short downpours are not adequate for this purpose. The best thing to do is watch for telltale signs of wilting, irregular patches, or visible foot prints in the grass after walking across the lawn.

**Q:** How much should I water?

**A:** For maximum water use, you want to apply at least one-half inch of water at a time. You can measure 1/2" by placing an empty tuna can under the spray of water from your sprinkler.

**Q:** What is the best time of day to water?

**A:** Ideally, very early morning is the best time to water (3 am to 6 am). You minimize water lose AND potential fungal growth. However, if the turf is under severe drought stress and local water regulations allow you to water, it may be necessary to water at a less than ideal time to save your turf.

**Q:** What if I live in a community that controls my watering?

**A:** Work with the association to make sure the water is being used to its fullest. But please beware that once the lakes go below a certain level irrigation may not be done and understand that the turf will turn brown and plants will wilt. Do your best on helping the community by watering your plants yourself using your water from your home to keep them alive. (about ½ gallon per plant twice a week around the base)

**Q:** Can I water too much?

**A:** Yes, too much water can be as damaging as too little water. Excessive water will encourage weeds such as dollar weed, and often causes a lawn to lose color quickly.

**Q:** I'm watering as much as my city or county (or watering budget) allows, and my lawn is still brown. Why?

**A:** In some areas customers are only allowed to water once a week and this can make it difficult to keep certain grass types green. Irrigation is meant to supplement natural rainfall, and in the absence of or normal showers, even the best irrigation system cannot keep up with the summer water demands of your grass.

**Q:** Should I just stop watering until the rains come?

**A:** NO! While the grass blades may turn off color or even brown, it is important that the roots and runner of the turf is kept alive. Once the rains start, the new growth will come from this part of the plant.

### Mowing and Irrigation Systems

**Q:** How does mowing affect the lawn during a drought?

**A:** Proper watering and mowing go hand in hand. For most grasses, the higher you mow, the deeper the root system, and the better able the grass can use the water. To get the most out of your restricted watering schedule, mow your St. Augustinegrass and Bahia grass at 3.5 to 4". The higher you mow your lawn the better during this drought.

**Q:** Is there anything more that I can do to help my lawn?

**A:** Make sure your irrigation system is working at its best. A periodic inspection should uncover any irrigation parts that need to be replaced. An irrigation system is like any other type of plumbing; parts wear out and need adjustment over time. TruGreen can provide you with a separate handout that focuses on keeping your sprinkler system efficient. Also you can water your plants that are showing signs of wilt by using your water from your home. This is a team effort during this trying time.

- 3) Clear ALL sprinkler heads of debris and overgrown grass for complete water coverage for the entire time you are away. All other sprinkler issues can be reported to management.

IF YOUR UNIT IS NOT PROPERLY MAINTAINED TO THE STANDARDS SET, YOU WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR THE COST TO ENSURE THAT IT IS
