ANNUAL MEETING: March 21, 2018 Please make plans to attend. There will be 2 new rules proposed. 1 from the Board and one thru a petition. Notices will go out by 2/19 with the full wording on the rules.

CANDIDATES FORUM: The candidate's forum for those who submit their intent to run for the Board will be held on Wednesday February 14th after the SRA meeting. This will give the residents a chance to meet the candidates prior to the ballots going out. There are 3 positions open. Please consider running if you feel you can contribute to the improvements of the park.

Mailroom Project: The recent frost damaged some plants in this area. We will trim back and expect all to come back once the weather improves. We are still looking for creative ideas for holiday themes and designs to the center section of the area. We left that area open for ongoing themes. Please submit ideas to the office.

City Water Leak Update: We (Shannon and I) were notified of and repaired 2 monster water leaks in the park – we think they were in the 100,000 gallon-a-month range. We will see for sure when we get the report back from the City. Well, 100,000 gallons is what we thought: we received the flow charts form the City of Tarpon, and the leaks at the time we repaired them would have been 1.2 MILLION gallons!! for the month if not discovered. From the use charts we feel that somewhere around 300,000 gallons of water was wasted before they surfaced.

In an unrelated water leak issue, tree roots pulled up a well water line about a foot and split it. Because of trees planted randomly in the past we are having issues now. We must rent a trencher to reroute the line due to all the roots in that area. We will also be doing other work to repair the front entrance (exit side) well irrigation system while we have the trencher.

LAWNS: Looks like the fungus is under control. The damaged areas will eventually come back once the weather turns. Again, please do not over-water these areas, as this will only promote faster weed growth.

CORRECTION: Clarification from January 2018 Beacon:

Palm tree planting – for those who want them replaced will be announced in the Feb Beacon with an attached form those to submit their written request.

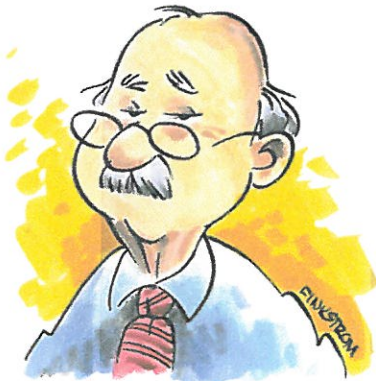
The above needs to be clarified – The association will not be replacing palm trees this season – that was my misprint.

How to Help Your Lawn Survive the Chill Written by Dr. Laurie Trenholm

Certainly, when we think of living in Florida, we do not generally think about losing our lawns to freezing temperatures. However, some homeowners in Florida may find themselves needing to replace portions of their lawn in the spring due to the cold weather. Here are some tips about how to prevent or reduce winterkill by preparing your lawn for the winter months and how to let your lawn recover from the big chill with minimal damage. All of our warm season turf grass species go into some degree of dormancy during the winter months, slowing their growth down and they may or may not stay green. This is a natural cycle, regardless of where you live in the state. In North and even Central Florida, lawns may stay green or may turn brown, either of which can be normal. Even in South Florida, lawns do not grow as quickly in the winter, even though they may remain green (less mowing required!). Regardless of where you are in the state, you should work to keep your lawn as healthy as possible through mowing, irrigating, and fertilizing practices. Lawns in South Florida are typically fertilized year-round with no problems. However, Central and North Florida lawns should not be fertilized after mid-September or late September. The last fertilization should be done with a fertilizer containing higher or equal amounts of potassium (the third number on the bag) relative to nitrogen (the first number on the bag), such as 15-0-15. This helps to impart some stress tolerance to cold or freezing temperatures and may enhance spring greenup. In Central Florida, do not fertilize lawns between October and the end of March. In North Florida, avoid fertilizing from mid-September through mid-April. Keep mowing height high year-round for additional enhanced stress tolerance (3.5" to 4" for most St. Augustine grass cultivars and Bahia grass and 2" to 2.5" for Centipede grass and coarse-textured Zoysia grass lawns).

Coming Out of the Freeze

Freezing temperatures will turn lawns brown. Do not panic, this is a normal part of winter dormancy. When the days become longer, and temperatures start to warm up in the spring, the growing points will become active, bringing green growth to the lawn again. Do not fertilize your lawn in the winter to try to green it up after a freeze— wait for the natural cycle of events to occur in the springtime. Fertilizing after a freeze will do more harm to your lawn than waiting for spring green-up. Do not apply a weed and feed product for preemergence weed control during the winter in Central and North Florida. Lawns generally do not require as much irrigation during winter months, so scale back your irrigation systems. In Central Florida, you may need to irrigate weekly or every other week, while in North Florida, it may be every three to four weeks. You will not need to mow for some time; when you do need to mow again, be sure to cut at the highest recommended height for your grass type. Do not "scalp" the lawn, as this makes it less able to recover from freeze damage.

How can you tell if your grass has truly succumbed to a winter freeze or if it is only dormant? One way is to cut small plugs of the grass (with roots and shoots attached) and plant them in a pot, put it in a warm spot with natural sunlight and see if the grass begins to grow.

If your lawn does not recover come springtime, remove the decayed vegetation from the affected areas and replace with either sod pieces or plugs. Do this before weeds have a chance to germinate and take hold of the ground. It is possible that not all of your lawn will be affected, perhaps just those areas that are most exposed to the cold temperatures.

Following these tips will help your lawn survive freezing temperatures.

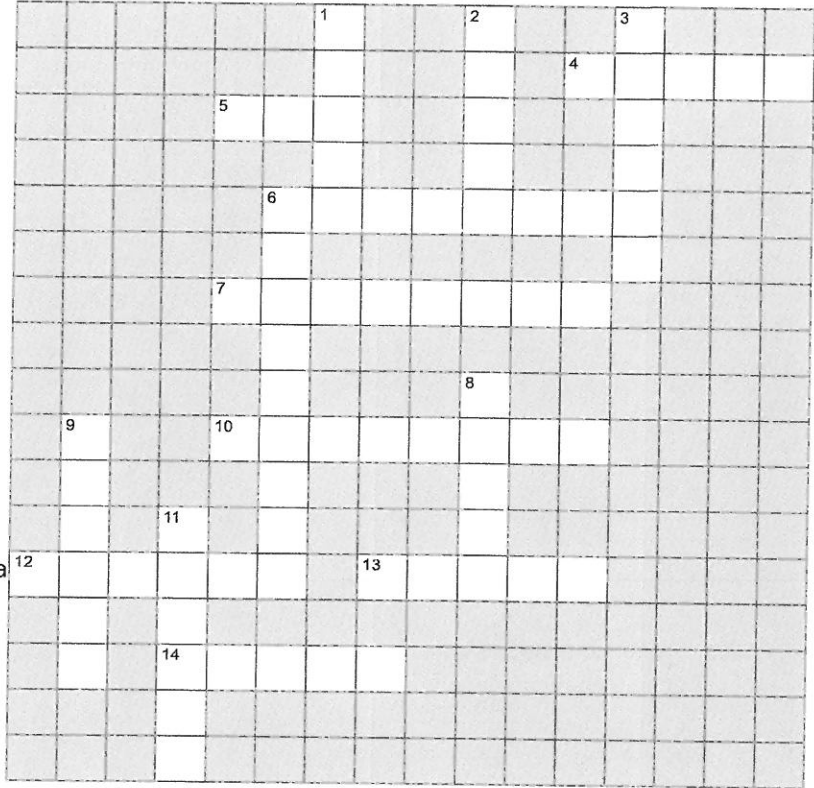
Just because the temperatures are dropping doesn't mean it's time to put having fun on ice. Heat up your mind by seeing how quickly you can complete this month's puzzle.

Chemicals:

- Automotive fluids
(Approved DOT containers not returned)
- Fertilizers, pesticides, fungicides, insecticides
- Florescent bulbs
- Household cleaners
- Mercury containing devices
- Oil and latex paint
- Paint thinner/remover
- Pool chemicals
- Rechargeable and automotive batteries
- Smoke detectors

Electronics:

- Cell phones
- Computer monitors
- Computer towers/CPU's
- Hard drives
- Laptops
- Battery in UPS power supply/surge protector
- Tablets
- Televisions (*must be whole*)

What NOT to bring

- Medicine or sharps
- Household Electronics such as vacuums & audio video equipment
- Appliances (*large or small*)
- Propane Tanks (over 1 lb.) or other compressed gases
- Fire extinguishers

How to package & transport chemicals:

- (1) **Do NOT** mix chemicals together.
- (2) Keep products in original labeled containers if possible.
- (3) Place containers into cardboard boxes, use crumpled newspaper to prevent breakage and keep chemicals upright and separated.
- (4) Place leaky container in clear plastic bag and transport in boxes with newspaper.
- (5) Individual chemical containers need to be visible for examination by staff.
- (6) Put boxes in the trunk or in back of vehicle away from passengers.
- (7) Tape battery terminals, or place each battery in a plastic bag to prevent short-circuits. Alkaline batteries should be disposed of in the garbage.
