#### RESIDENT REMINDERS...

#### FLY-AWAY / SNOWBIRD FORMS

It is **REQUIRED** that residents leaving the park for 2 or more weeks submit a <u>COMPLETED</u> Fly-Away form that must include a DESIGNATED CARETAKER for your SHRUBS, LAWN & SPRINKLER MAINTENANCE. Before leaving the park, remember to TURN OFF CITY WATER, but be sure to **LEAVE YOUR IRRIGATION WATER ON**.

#### **EXTERIOR MAINTENANCE**

Thank you to those that have taken care of driveway cleaning or repainting, exterior painting, and carport cleaning. However, there are still those that need to address overdue

maintenance - especially pressure cleaning and/or painting and flower bed weeding/cleaning. Please make it a priority – and remember if it involves PAINTING it requires that an *Application to Make Changes or Additions* is submitted in advance.

#### STREET PARKING

When parking on the street, please LEAVE ADEQUATE DISTANCE between your vehicle and the ADJACENT driveway so that your neighbor's visibility to oncoming vehicles as they leave their carport is NOT OBSTRUCTED. This is especially important if the street-parked vehicle is a truck or SUV with a higher and wider profile. Seeing over or around the larger vehicles is difficult, and the extra distance allows greater visibility and easier access, especially for lower vehicles.

#### DOGS...

**DOG WALKING is ONLY permitted at the designated area at the front entrance**. Dog
walking is NOT permitted along the streets or in a
common area other than the designated area
specified in the Stonehedge Rules and
Regulations. This has been repeated over and
over in past Beacon issues. PLEASE, FOLLOW THE
RULES!

DOG MUST BE LEASHED even when on the exterior of YOUR unit. Dogs may not roam freely...and dog owners must always PICK-UP their dog's waste. This information is being repeated due to reports of UNLEASHED dogs being let out by their owners on unit lots and common areas. PLEASE, FOLLOW THE RULES!

VISITING DOGS to any non-dog lot REQUIRE BOARD APPROVAL IN ADVANCE. Submit request in writing to the Office at least 10 days prior to date of visit. (Refer to Stonehedge Rules and Regulations, Pet section.)

#### SPEED LIMIT 15 MPH - All the Time!

The most recent concerns regarding speeding cite the early morning hours before 7 AM. The park Speed Limit is 15 MPH every hour of the day or night. PLEASE don't make the mistake of

speeding because you think you have the road to yourself. YOU DO NOT. Please, consider the safety of your fellow residents who walk and bike in the early morning and ALWAYS observe the park speed limit.

#### **US 19 ENTRANCE - SIDEWALK CAUTION**

Please approach the outgoing US 19 exit slowly and STOP before the sidewalk. Recently I encountered a bike rider speeding north along the US19 **sidewalk** that nearly hit my car; a few seconds later and I could have hit him! **Please**, **stop at the white STOP LINE and be aware of bicyclists**, **runners**, **or pedestrians traveling on the sidewalk and crossing the main entrance**.

#### TALES OF THE SOUTH PACIFIC

The Grand Australia and Zealand cruise set sail from San Diego, California on January 3. After



downtown, absorbing the sights and sounds of this American city with the beautiful ocean as a backdrop. The next port was Hilo, Big Island, Hawaii. As we did over four years ago, we elected to spend this day exploring the island with our ultimate goal the awesome beautiful Hawaii Botanical Garden. Built on a sloping volcanic rock hillside, this garden is verdant with beautiful flowering plants, shrubs with enormous leaves, and very large tall trees. Although the walk is arduous for us, we loved it and enjoyed the songs of the birds high in the trees serenading the visitors to this tropical paradise. An island formerly known as Christmas Island in the country now called Kiribati, once a British protectorate called the Gilbert Islands, was our next port of call. This remote place, now called Kiritimati, is actually called an atoll, not an island.

The extremely flat land formation barely above sea level is made of sand and coral reefs. We managed to dodge the very shallow sand bars and reefs and made landing in a lifeboat, known as a tender when used for this purpose! The very friendly people, including children jumping up and down and calling Hi and Bye, were obviously happy to see us. Most of the children are barefoot but cleanly dressed in good clothing. The homes are basically metal shacks with window and door openings. There is some electricity. Other buildings include a small grocery store, some churches, a hotel, a couple of open air bars, and a fish processing plant. We did not see a school, but the heat and humidity caused us to head back to the ship after an hour of walking, not really exploring the place in its entirety! Historically, Christmas Island is known

for its role in the dropping of nuclear bombs in its waters, by Britain, from 1957 to 1962 when the ban on nuclear bomb testing was enacted.

American Samoa is a territory of the US, valued for its large natural harbour and its tuna cannery and fish processing. The Samoans gain from the political alliance by being able to sell Asian fish to American markets without paying tariffs. Land ownership is governed by law, requiring the owner to be one-half Samoan. Land is passed from one generation to the next by going to the child who is the best behaved and the most obedient!!! The island is very green with lush plant growth on the steep hillsides, interspersed with some homes and buildings are along the shore. The temperature of 31C or about 90 F and very high humidity caused us to hurry back to the ship after about on and onehalf hours ashore slowly wandering!

Yesterday in in American Samoa was Thursday, January 18. Today in Samoa is Saturday January 20 after crossing the International Dateline! Samoa has the same culture and language and traditions as American Samoa, just with different economic ties. Historically and economically it is under the auspices of New Zealand and trades with the countries to its west. Samoa is a member of the United Nations and is an independent state, being the first small island in the Pacific to claim independence. The economy appears to be doing well. The city is bustling. We enjoyed walking the downtown, exploring the dominant church, architecturally, as well as the people and the items available in the shops. Once again, heat and humidity drove us back to the ship-in a taxi both ways to combat the weather!

We have set our view on further countries to the west, exploring more of the South Pacific as well as spending over a month in Australia, and then exploring New Zealand before heading home by way of more Pacific Islands!

#### "COMMUNITY CATS" AT STONEHEDGE?

What Is a Community Cat (Feral, Stray or free roaming Cat)? These cats don't have typical owners. Instead, they're sometimes cared for by the community or individuals. True feral cats aren't socialized, are on high alert, and fear humans. Usually, they bolt at the first sight or sound of humans. These are cats left to fend for themselves and usually have very little interaction with humans, seeking hiding places or shelters were they can.

Female cats can become pregnant as young as 4 or 5 months old and can have up to three litters of kittens in a single year. So it's no surprise that colonies can be as large as 200 cats—but most cat colonies include around 20 to 30 cats. Stonehedge has such a colony of community cats.

Multi-generational groups live and have been born under our mobile homes, creating problems such as health issues, flea infestations, shredded duct-work or insulation, necessitating costly repairs.

Sometimes people don't like supporting community cats with shelter or food because they worry that this will increase the number of cats. Or, they would prefer that the cats were simply gone. Some prefer to feed them, leaving out open bowls of cat food, which can do more harm than good.

We have to responsibly handle by having a controlled population of feral cats discourage open bowl, free range feeding. So how do we humanely care for this colony of feral cats? It is recommended that when feeding cat colonies, only feed at specific times of the day and promptly remove leftover food. This will prevent attracting those unwanted predators such as coyote, raccoons and rodents. A well controlled cat community does help keep the ecosystem in check by hunting rodents and pests. However be mindful of open bowl feeding and how it affects our own park and your neighbors.

Pinellas County further states that Under the TNVR program, you can legally provide food and care for community cats within the following guidelines: A community cat must be sterilized, up to date on their rabies vaccination & distinguished from other cats by being eartipped and tattooed. In other words, if you feed them and encourage their presence in our park, then be part of the solution.

This is where Trap-Neuter-Return programs are critical in helping limit the cat population. The humane approach traps, spays or neuters and returns community cats to their original location. When resources are available, cats may be vaccinated as well.

Meow Now, a program of Friends of Strays, participates in the TNVR efforts in Pinellas County. Pinellas County Animal Services has partnered with Friends of Strays Shelter for the RTF program Pinellas Cats Alive! #### Let Your Lawn Tell You When To Water <sup>1</sup>

#### How Often Do I Need to Irrigate?

People often ask for specific recommendations on how often to irrigate their lawns. There is no simple answer to this, as water requirements vary due to grass species, time of year, geographical location in the state, soil conditions, amount of shade, and overall maintenance level of the lawn. We can draw some broad generalities, but these should be considered guidelines rather than recommendations. Based on research done some years ago, the guideline presented in Table 1 was developed. Again, these intervals will vary depending on all of the variables previously mentioned.

Most homeowners over-water their lawns, which may damage or kill the lawn over time. Excess irrigation is one of the major causes of lawn demise and may include problems such as a shallow root system; increased disease, weed, or insect infestation; reduced drought tolerance; increased thatch and excessive growth; and reduced tolerance to other stresses such as shade and soil problems. To avoid over-watering, look for signs that the lawn needs water.

### How Does the Lawn Tell Me When It Needs Water?

How can you avoid over-watering? The best way is to let your lawn tell you when it needs water. Look for these signs:




Figure 1. Lawns under drought stress curl up their leaves.

- 1. Lawns under drought stress will curl up their leaf blades in an attempt to minimize leaf area (Figure 1). When leaf blades reach the V-stage is the optimal time to water.
- 2. Drought-stressed lawns take on a blue-gray cast rather than remaining green.
- 3. Footprints or tire tracks remain visible on a drought-stressed lawn long after having been made.

As the soil begins to dry out, the lawn will show a lack of available moisture by wilted leaf blades. This condition is evidenced by a lengthwise folding or rolling of the blades, caused by a loss of turgor or water pressure within the plant (Figure 1). Wilting is best seen on the older leaves of the grass plant because the youngest leaf is not fully expanded and will appear as if it is wilted.

Unless rain is forecast in the next 24 hours, lawns should be irrigated when 30 to 50 percent of the lawn shows signs of wilt. Lawns growing along the coast may require more frequent irrigation due to the increase in wind, which tends to dry the turf out quickly.

## How Do I Train My Roots to Grow More Deeply?




Figure 2. Irrigate and mow to encourage deep rooting.

With many parts of Florida now under mandated watering regulations, your lawn may show some signs of requiring irrigation in between watering times. To best prepare your lawn for this, train it to become more drought-tolerant by encouraging deeper roots (Figure 2). Irrigating only when the grass begins to show signs of needing water and watering the proper amount is one way to increase root depth. Another way to encourage deeper rooting is by mowing properly. Mow at the highest recommended height for your grass type and the roots will tend to grow to greater depths.

#### **How Much Water Should I Apply?**

Your objective when irrigating is to get the maximum amount of water to the root zone without over-irrigating. In most Florida soils, this is somewhere between 1/2 to 1 inch of water. Sandy

soils will generally wet to a depth of 12 inches for each inch of water applied. This will target the majority of the root system and encourage more rooting at lower depths. In heavier soils, as are often found in north Florida, less water may be adequate and you might only apply 1/2 to 3/4 inch. In parts of southeast Florida, or wherever there may be hard limestone less than 12 inches below ground, you may also need less water. With less soil, there is no point in trying to encourage deeper rooting.

When watering restrictions limit the frequency with which we can irrigate, some people are tempted to irrigate to the point of run-off. **This should never be done**, as we are wasting water, encouraging disease and weed problems, and creating potential pollution problems. This is not only wasteful but may also damage or kill your lawn.

To determine how long to run your sprinkler system to apply this much water, set out coffee or tuna fish cans around the perimeter of the sprinkler system and see how long it takes to fill them to the desired depth. Be sure to check your irrigation system for uniform coverage at the same time. Your irrigation system should be zoned separately for turf and ornamentals as irrigation requirements differ between the species. Rain sensors, which are mandatory on all new irrigation systems, should always be functional and in place (Figure 3).
