ANNUAL MEETING INFO

Speaking of Stonehedge we may have some changes coming in 2017 and beyond and that will be based on your vote. The Annual meeting of the Membership is on March 15th. Residents will be receiving information in 2 mailings.

The first mailing scheduled to go out by 1/15 will include your intent to run for the Board (we have 3 positions opening) Ken Collier, Jerry Kinsey and Terry Ellingson's terms are up. They have all done a wonderful job to date and we hope they run

again but thanks are in order for the job they have done the past 3 years to improve the quality of life here at Stonehedge. If you intend to run, your Intent form must be returned by February 3.

The 2nd mailing will include a list of those who chose to run for the open board position and a ballot and proxy vote. This mailing will go out no later than February 13.

Stonehedge has no major projects planned for 2017. The loan for the roads and drain lines project will be paid off in August but there are no plans set after that payoff.

Looks like 2017 we will continue to tweak our preventative maintenance programs on the property and do the necessary long term improvements that will keep us operating smoothly through 2017 and into the future.

One item that we have ongoing from 2016 to 2017 is our lawn situation which I will explain briefly.

We will continue with TruGreen for the 2017 year for pest control. They have been on site 3 times in mid-December to spray for fungus (all at no cost to Stonehedge). We have had perfect conditions for fungus to thrive and it has. We identified over 30 yards with these issues which is the reason we have not had the lawns cut for the past month. Fungus is easily tracked by mower tires and even walking on it for that matter. We are all fighting mother nature on this one. We have also controlled the sprinkler systems at the advice of TruGreen. Unfortunately, we are on a day to day basis until we can assure the fungus is under control and since TruGreen manages our lawns we are taking their advice until further notice. 

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Watering Your Lawn in the Winter

Today on Gardening in a Minute: watering your lawn in the winter.

Lawns in Florida need less water during winter than during the rest of the year. In the spring, you may water your grass every three to five days, but in the winter it may only require watering every two to three weeks.

Grass grows more slowly during the colder months, requiring less watering and mowing.

To save water, set your irrigation timer to manual throughout the year. Water your grass only when it shows signs of stress: when about half the blades are folded in half and blue-gray in color, and when footprints remain on the lawn.

To condition your lawn for dryer periods, water deeply, and only when needed. Deep watering and high mowing will encourage deeper roots.

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Landscape Questions and Answers on Frost / Freeze Damage

1. My lawn is brown? We understand and would like to discuss what is happening to your turf right now. When air and soil temperatures drop below a certain point, the turfgrass stops producing chlorophyll, which means the grass isn't as green.
2. So you are saying my grass isn't really dead? That is correct; your grass is still alive, just dormant or semi-dormant due to the freeze. The cold temperature just basically turns your grass off till it warms back up. The grass will bounce back to a good color as the temperatures rise back up and stay up.
3. My grass and plants are brown they need more water? NO, in the winter months, we need to avoid this temptation and dramatically reduce our irrigation or just turn it off. The grass simply does not need it, and the fine delicate roots will literally rot if we over water during the winter.
4. What are those dead spots in my lawn? Those areas are carpet grass. Carpet grass is a warm season grassy weed, so when the temperatures drop that turf will shut down and go dormant. It will look like someone sprayed round-up (weed killer) in that area. Once the temperatures go back up those areas will begin to green up.
5. My plants and trees have turned brown and are dropping leaves? This is very normal after a frost or a freeze. This occurs when temperatures drop below a plants tolerance. Plants / Trees not hardy to the area are more prone to low freeze damage. Your ixoras and hibiscus are more common to drop leaves after the first frost or freeze.
6. What are the symptoms of frost injury? Injury symptoms are brown or black leaves or branches, stem or branch die back. The flowers, fruits, or buds fall off.
7. My plants are losing there leaves? Very common after a freeze. The plant will normally lose the damaged leaves due to the cold weather.
8. Should we prune back the plants now? NO, in the spring once the we are out of any chance of more cold weather is the best time to prune injured or dead branches or twigs after new growth has started.
9. What will happen if we prune back the plants now? We will open up the plant for more damage or death if we get another freeze or even a frost. We know they may look un-slightly but in the spring they will bounce right back.
10. Will the fertilization help during this time of the year? Yes, applying fertilizer during the winter months is very important. The turf and plants store the needed nutrients and this helps them recover faster once the temperatures warm up.

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
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
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
