### **Around the Park:**

<u>City Water Line Project:</u> the survey has been completed on the areas we are looking to attach

to the City 10" line to our North. Now the Engineers will proceed to do our model and drawings to present for bids. Expected to be completed by end of August.

<u>Wells</u> - By turning off the Wells during our recent rains we conserved over 3 million gallons of water. If the wells are not closed, please be aware of the rainfall and do not run sprinklers if we get more than 1" of in in the week.

<u>Finally</u> - the holes created in the clubhouse from the new water lines going in are being repaired and should be completed by the time this article is out

<u>Pressure washing</u> we have started to pressure wash the sidewalks around the clubhouse and shuffle courts and will continue with the sidewalks.

<u>Waste services</u> - We have noticed from time to time after Waste Management picks up our trash there are some spots of glass or smelly liquids left in the street where they compact the trash. We have let them know of the issues and hopefully they get them corrected. The trucks are supposed to be sealed so nothing like this happens but...

# The Landscape Article August 2013 By the landscape guy

Rain, Rain, stick around- keep my grass green all year round !!! Nature, as destructive as it is at times can be wonderful for those who embrace. This is the perfect world of gardening, you have to do nothing and your grass remains green, your shrubs thicken up with lush green leaves and vibrant flowers.

Strong daily rains can cover up even the most neglected lawns. Now granted if you had no grass to speak of then the rains will strengthen the weeds and you will have some work to do next season, but let's focus on what the natural rains have brought.

Nothing beats natural rains. The nutrients and trace elements that are found in natural rain far exceed anything that you can put on your lawns during the year. It's called nature for a reason, over the years nature has perfected what the earth needs to survive. Previous articles have attempted to kick start our lawns and wait for these moments of consistent natural rains.

Now I want to make it perfectly clear, if you have done nothing during the year, the natural rains will cover up some lack of work on your part but for only a short time. You still need to prepare for this time of year, following articles will help you along with that.

With all this wonderful rain there are still signs of stress that you should look for, one being patches of dead ,dry grass, this is an indication that a fungus has invaded your lawn. Too much water will activate a dormant fungus. Fungus starts to form many ways, 2 of them being carried in from other infected yards on the tires of lawn mowers or from too much water sitting on the lawn. If you see these areas forming in your yard –please get to your local supply store and purchase a fungus (disease) control product and apply it to and around the infected area. Also notify management so the lawn service company can be made aware of these issues. Fungus issues can be devastating to the lawns and these issues must be acted upon quickly.

Another sign of too much water is the appearance of dollar weed. Dollar weed germinates in wet, low drainage areas of a lawn. Areas that do not drain well are not necessarily the owner's or landscapers' fault, over time some areas of a year become more compact that others, some hidden indentations may form that are hidden by a good healthy lawn, when the water sites in these areas, dollar weed will germinate. No need to panic, dollar week is easily controlled by a store-bought weed control product (IMAGE was one brand name that comes to mind), but you still have to go to the areas in your yard were you saw it germinate and use a pitch fork or some kind of tined tool and poke around in that area to aerate the soil to allow the water to drain into the ground.

Please remember when we are getting consistent rains during the week of an inch or 2; manually turn off your sprinkler system if you have one. The extra water will only encourage disease and dollar weed. We try our best to turn off the Wells as another effort to curb overwatering, but we cannot predict the dry spells.

One thing to try to remember from all this rain is that natural rain contains many more nutrients and minerals that sprinkler water. If you put as much sprinkler water on your lawns as we have had rainwater in the past month, your lawn would either be yellow, loaded with fungus or dollar weed. Sprinkler water is only used as an aid to the natural water that we get. During dry spells I fully understand that there is no other substitute other than sprinkler water, in that case it is a necessity, but still must be used cautiously as directed in previous articles.

To all homeowners at Stonehedge Residents Inc.,

I am writing to each homeowner at Stonehedge at the direction of the Board to repeat what has been repeated time and time again. And now again. It's a repeat of the Rules and Regulations that you signed on to uphold when you purchased in Stonehedge. Whether you purchased this year or 20 years ago there is no difference.

I am in my 15<sup>th</sup> year as property manager of Stonehedge. I speak from experience and believe me have heard it all and then some. There is no excuse for continued Rule's violations.

I expect you, as a homeowner, to understand your responsibilities, which simply is maintain your home and respect the rules.

I am informing you that if you receive an inspection report notice you are not the only one. There are OVER 65 homes that have been identified as in need of general maintenance. Many items are simple fixes and should be addressed immediately before you get a notice to repair. No one is left out; Board members will receive notices, as well as, management being informed of common areas that need to be maintained.

REMEMBER you have the right: There is a formal process in place for all residents to request a rule change

A detailed inspection has been done of the entire park, common areas and homes alike Most common items:

- Mold on homes and driveways some driveways are in need of painting as well
- Facia trim around homes is discolored or faded and in need of paint
- Clutter / unacceptable items stored around home- ladders/old block and assorted other materials
- Clutter / unacceptable items stored in carport trash pails/recycle bins/ dead flowerpots/pool towels draped on furniture / various unacceptable items
- Umbrella laundry racks and patio umbrellas left out when not in use

I fully understand the challenge of storage in mobile homes, if over 200+ homes can do it - so can you

Another noticeable item was work done outside the home without an approved Request to make Additions or Changes Form on file. This is not acceptable.

### Procedure for violations that will be sent - according to the Rules and Regulations

- 1. Nature of the violation, with photo, and rule violated,
- 2. Deadline to cure the violation,
- 3. Consequences (fine can result if not cured in time frame allotted).

I ask this be taken care of now. Notices will go out and it will be addressed. Again, a simple fix and homeowner responsibility. As per your documents the board has the right to do the repairs upon notice to the owner and bill for those services.

I hope we have an understanding of my and your responsibility. I appreciate prompt attention to the matters mentioned above. If you need any assistance or handyman recommendations, please call.


