The Landscape Article

By the landscape guy January-2021

Hi to all who have prepared for the Florida winter. If you have taken some of the advice given over the past year with regards to your lawn and plants, then when we hit the growing season you will be able to relax a bit more than those who just let things go.

I will give a brief bullet point summery of what items to look for and do with the expected cooler weather that supposed to be coming in Jan-Feb and March

If your shrubs do not look healthy or full:

- O Check your neighbors or neighborhood and see what has stayed healthy thru the season
- o Make sure after trimming that there is an abundance of new growth- if not it may be time to replace
- Check to make sure you have the proper amount of mulch under the shrubs and bushes (approx. 3-4 inches)

Plants that can sustain a 30 degree temperature for more than one day are your best bets for our area. Plants that are good to zone 9 should fit that bill. We are actually on the line of 9 and 9A. The colder the area, the lower the zone #. Plantings that hold up in the colder zones may not hold up in the warmer ones so its best to review the range of zones plants are good in.

Remember if you take the time, one time, your selection of shrubs and flowers will last for years.

If you would like some color during the winter season:

Look into annuals (these are plants that thrive in certain seasons then die). There is a large selection of these that produce great color. Check the internet or your local nursery (I said nursery- not the Home Depos of the world- unless you have run into someone that you trust there- the knowledge is limited at best)

More on these above subjects in March and April

Below is the January article form the Florida extension service that repeats what the past umpteen landscape articles have spoken about.

Hello Everyone,

It is the time of the year again – you might have guessed it, I am not only referring to the Holidays. I am writing to remind you to skip a week of irrigation during the cooler months of December, January and February. According to the University of Florida, grass doesn't need to be watered as often during the cooler months. In fact, this time of the year,

St. Augustine grass only needs one-half to three quarters of an inch of irrigation-water every 10-14 days. Overwatering does not only waste water it also can encourage pests and diseases in the landscape. Skipping a week of watering is as easy as 'off' for community associations and residents with irrigation timers. Turn the timer to 'off' for the week that you want to skip, and 'on' for the week that you want to water,"

You can determine when your grass needs water when

- Grass blades are folded in half lengthwise.
- Grass appears blue-gray in color.
- Footprints remain on the lawn for several minutes after walking on it.

Watering only every other week or less during the winter will not only improve landscape health, it will also help to conserve drinking water and protect our resources. Therefore start "skipping" today and spread the word among your friends, neighbors and clients.



Crime Watch Newsletter

The Alert Pinellas City of Tarpon Springs (Reverse 911) everyone is familiar that it order to report an emergency situation, you can dial 911 for help. However, the Alert Pinellas City of Tarpon Springs (Reverse 911) system calls you at times when residents need to be informed of situations where life and property are concerned to where a situation may create detours due to construction or a public event.

The Alert Pinellas City of Tarpon Springs (Reverse 911) system is a mass communication tool used to notify citizens of critical situations, crime alerts, crime prevention information, and other information deemed to be in the interest of the citizens and property of Tarpon Springs. The Alert Pinellas City of Tarpon Springs (Reverse 911) system is an internet browser computer system that uses a combination of an address database and GIS mapping technology.

The system can send out messages to a specific geographic area, or a specific list of streets, households, or individuals, with a common interest. In addition, the Ale Pinellas City of Tarpon Springs (Reverse 911) System has the capability to leave a message on an answering machine. Even if an individual's telephone is busy at th time, the system can redial that number at predetermined intervals. Some of the situations where the Alert Pinellas City of Tarpon Springs (Reverse 911) System can be used for are:

* Missing or endangered children and elderly adults.

* Evacuations or information concerning critical incidents.

* Neighborhood Crime Watch information.

* Street closures due to construction or public events.

* Crime Alerts to a specific area or group.

* Boil water notices.

The Alert Pinellas City of Tarpon Springs (Reverse 911) system also has a self-registration portal. This self-registration portal gives the public the opportunity to enter additional contact information to receive a notification. Examples would be cell phone numbers, work numbers, and business numbers. If a notification was to be issued in the area of your home and/or your business the notification would also sent to any additional numbers you listed in the self-registration portal. 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
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
